Professor Annette Boaz graduated with a degree in Politics from the University of Durham in 1993. She also completed a Masters in Social Research at the University of Oxford and a doctorate in Politics at Queen Mary, University of London. She is currently Professor of Health Care Research and St George's University of London and Kingston University.

Prior to her current role she has worked at the Universities of Oxford, Warwick, Queen Mary, University of London and Kings College London. She also completed a secondment to the Policy Research Programme at the UK Department of Health.

She has spent more than 20 years exploring the relationship between research, policy and practice in the UK and internationally. She was a Founder Editor of the international journal Evidence & Policy. She has conducted research for a range of funders including the UK National Institute for Health Research (NIHR), the Economic and Social Research Council and the European Commission.

She supports a number of national initiatives aimed at increasing capacity for research use including the NIHR Knowledge Mobilization Fellowship scheme and the UK Implementation Society and in 2018 she was a member of the panel for the Irish Health Research Board Impact Award. She is a member of the World Health Organisation European Advisory Committee on Health Research. With Kathryn Oliver she leads a collaboration designed to transform the use of research evidence (Transform URE). With Huw Davies, Sandra Nutley and Alec Fraser she has edited a new book 'What Works Now: Evidence Informed Policy and Practice' which was published in March 2019.



Tom Jefford worked in Local Government for 25 years (Youth Offending, alternative education, MST, community safety and Drug and Alcohol services) before establishing a spin out Social Enterprise, Family Psychology Mutual of which he is joint CEO. FPM specialises in edge of care services and is delivering services in Norfolk Suffolk and London. Tom was a board member of CSSL which delivered the Social Impact Bond in Essex using Multi Systemic Therapy.

He has a long standing interest in evidence based interventions for children and young people and will shortly be awarded a professional doctoral from Anglia Ruskin University concerning implementation of Multi Systemic Therapy in three Local Government settings.

He supports a social enterprise which is a café run by people in recovery in Cambridge and is a founding board member of both the UK Implementation Society and of the European Implementation Collaborative. He was previously a fellow at the Go Lab at Oxford.
