book review

Handbook on Implementation Science: (Eds P Nilsen and S Birken, 2020)

In the recently published Handbook on Implementation Science, Nilsen and Birken present a comprehensive and accessible overview to the field's multidisciplinary history, key theoretical approaches and concepts, and methods.

Nilsen kicks off with an introduction that provides a useful foundation for making sense of the array of theories, models and frameworks (TMF) in implementation (drawing on his earlier work e.g. [Nilsen 2015](#)). This is followed by series of chapters each focusing on a key TMF from the field with a summary of the concept and its application written by the originator. These chapters are an excellent place to start for people who want to an overview of the key TMF 'straight from the horse's mouth' e.g. May on Normalization Process Theory, Damschroder on the Consolidated Framework for Implementation Research (CFIR), Michie on the Behaviour Change Wheel, etc.



Once you have the theory under your belt, the second part of the book addresses the key concepts in implementation science i.e. strategies, context, outcomes, fidelity, adaptation and sustainability. Again, the chapters are written by people who have led the field in developing our thinking on these key concepts e.g. Proctor on outcomes, Carroll on fidelity. I particularly enjoyed Lennox's chapter, which gives a great synthesis of the evidence for sustainability (building on earlier work, [Lennox et al 2019](#)). Part three explores implementation science from a range of perspectives, such as individual behaviour change, organisations, and policy. Helpfully, there is also a chapter discussing improvement science (in contrast to implementation science), which can often be an area of confusion for people new to the field or for those who coming from a quality improvement perspective.

The final section of the book is about doing implementation science research. The section starts by bring us full circle back to TMF with a chapter by Birken giving us guidance on selecting a theoretical approach when doing implementation science research (linked to her work on theory selection e.g. [Birken et al 2017](#), [Birken et al 2018](#)). This is followed by a series of chapters outlining different approaches to undertaking implementation science research, which include hybrid trial and mixed methods designs, ethnography, social network analysis, and realist evaluation.

Nilsen and Birken have done great work as Editors in producing a book that provides a clear and comprehensive framework to help readers make sense of and navigate the science implementation directly from the key thinkers in the field. It offers a useful entry point into the wealth of evidence underpinning the field. Whilst the hardback isn't cheap (£157.50), the eBook is more accessible at £48. It's definitely a key text to ask your university library to buy for students and researchers of implementation science.

Handbook on Implementation Science (2020) is edited by Per Nilsen, Department of Health, Medicine and Caring Sciences, Linköping University (Sweden) and Sarah A. Birken, Wake Forest School of Medicine (USA) and published by Edward Elgar Publishing.

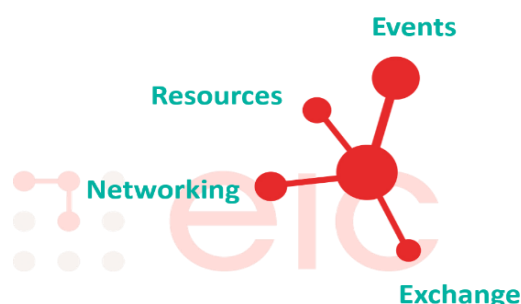

meet the board

Continuing our series of profiles of the UK Implementation Society Board, meet **Emma Ross, Trustee and Programme Manager in Leeds City Council Children and Families Service.**

Emma works at the sharp end of social care practice and gives us some insights into the continuing gap that can exist between on-the-ground practice, and the sometimes ivory tower feel of academic implementation science.....

I am a registered mental health nurse and have worked in Child and Adolescent mental health for over 30 years. I am currently leading in Multisystemic Therapy (including MST, MST-CAN and MST-FIT) for Leeds City Council, which works with children, young people and their families using an evidence-based intensive family support model to prevent entry to care and reunify young people home from care. In Leeds I am also part of Rethink (in the Innovations team) and Futures (working with young people who have experienced the loss of an infant through care proceedings).

I was introduced to the science of implementation theories and practice approximately 12 years ago when I first started working with Multi-systemic Therapy, which uses an extremely thorough implementation approach to underpin its set up and ongoing delivery.

From a nursing perspective, using the nursing process (Assess, Plan, Implement, Evaluate) it all made rather beautiful sense and I have been a proponent ever since. My job requires that I am active in setting up new services and ensuring that they are effectively evaluated and I could not do this (or at least I could not do this well) without knowledge and understanding of implementation science and practice.

I find my role as Scientific Lead for UK-IS very exciting. I very much aspire to promote a useful dialogue between researchers and practitioners through this role, via workshops and events and representation of UK-IS at research conferences. There is a risk that our field becomes fractured over time between its academic and its practice arms – UK-IS is proactively trying to avoid such a rift by bringing together researchers and practitioners in everything that it does.

Over the last 4 years I have led on the creation and implementation of one part of a DfE-funded innovation programme in Leeds Children and Families services which has seen the implementation of an implementation team (the Rethink team) no less to enable wider service changes. This work has been very positively evaluated and has relied heavily on what we know both in theory and practice about how to best implement a new idea:

The notion of a science around implementation is now becoming common language, at least within Leeds Children and Families services leadership, as it becomes more and more obvious to everyone how useful the methodology and the Rethink team themselves can be. For example, Rethink have been instrumental in supporting teams through developing COVID-19 responses and provided much needed structure where there might otherwise have been chaos. And similarly, the team are moving forward alongside a variety of services into the challenges and changes that will be necessary in the organisation post-COVID.

Implementation science in the past has often struggled to effectively engage with practice in meaningful or sustainable ways and for some, has been seen as a largely academic pursuit. UK-IS is of course actively endeavouring to change this – but I can tell you that it is not always easy being a nurse and a practitioner in a room full of academics - especially when the priorities and end goals around why we are talking to each other in the first place are not always the same. I think implementation theory might have something to say about that!

It would be great to have more practitioners involved as trustees and contributors within UK-IS because as we all know – what it looks like on paper or even in your best mind's eye is not always how it plays out in real life.
